- 1. The following information has been obtained after an interview with two officers who evaded capture by the enemy after being in enemy-occupied territory.
- 2. Further circulation of this information may be made, but when doing so, no information as to the source may be divulged.

Statement of information covering period from 4 July 1943 to 10 August 1943

- 1. Observed in MANTES German staff cars and jeeps painted a khaki color similar to American military cars. Saw none of blue-gray German color. 25 July 1943
- 2. Observed around CLISSON Panzer troops in approximately two hundred armored cars and tanks. 8 July 1943
- 3. Observed flying over NANTES a JU 52 with a large ring around fuselage.
- 4. Hearsay The Germans now have the greater part of the TODT organization working on fortifications northeast of PARIS, These fortifications extend in a line from LILLE to AMINIS and then in a southeasterly direction. The line is similar to one of the lines of the last war. 26 July 1943
- 5. High-ranking French Army officer stated that the submarine pens at ST NAZAIRE should be bombed by low-altitude torpedo bombers in conjunction with protective smoke screen. 8 July 1943
- 6. Large numbers of armored cars mounting guns with two sets of dual wheels in the rear were observed in small villages between ST PHILBERT LE GRAND-LIEU and MANTES. 11 July 1943
- 7. All main streets in NANTES have smoke screen apparatus at intervals of 50 feet. This type of apparatus is located along the road between LA BASSE INDRE and NANTES, parallel to the LOIRE, 21 July 1943
- 8. Observed German troops entraining to the north from PETREHORADE 7 August 1943. French source stated that large numbers of German troops have been withdrawn from Spanish frontier.

  French source said that thousands of German troops with horses had

9. arrived in COMPIEGIO. In this town a large complete bridge mounted on wheels was seen, according to source. 26 July 1943

10. French source stated that Germans occasionally ran troop trains on regular passenger schedules and sent civilian trains our on irregular schedules in an effort to combat sabotage.

We left CHILVESTON at 0945 hours 4 July 1943 to bomb NAMTIS. On the way to the target the high squadron of our Group was stacked low instead of high and we flew in 'prop' wash all the way. We encountered light flak but no fighters before dropping our bombs. As soon as our bomb-bay doors were closed four FW 190's attacked high at 5 to 7 o'clock. We shot down the first three of the fighters but the fourth one sprayed us with machine gun bullets and 20 mm shells. The right bomb support was cut through about a foot above the catwalk. The radio room caught many hits and the interphone was shot out. Fire spread from the bomb-bay to between the two outside engines.

PLANE ON FIRE

> The alarm bell was switched on although Lt Mokke states it failed to work in the navigator's compartment. The order to bale out was given over the 'inter-com' and the nose of the plane was dipped several times. Aft the co-pilot and engineer had left the ship I tried but did not succeed

There was a fighter about 75 yards from the plane, so I delayed my jump to about 10000 feet. At 5000 feet I noticed gun fire from the ground and received a flesh wound behind my left ear. Later, while hiding my parachute I counted five bullet holes in the silk.

I landed in a plowed field about ten miles north of NANTES. While \_ I was hiding my chute two French boys came up to me. We put my chute under a brush pile and then ran about 4000 yards to a farmhouse. I was hidden in a barm under a pile of straw. Early the next morning one of the boys led me into a field and left me in a bramble patch. I was there all day but went back into the barn to sleep at night. At noon Germans came to the house but after fifteen minutes left without searching the fields. I spent that night in the barn and returned to the field early the next morning. That afternoon a Doctor came to see me. I had three pieces of flak in my right cheek.

JOURNEY GODGERS ARRANGED

My subsequent journey was arranged while I was at this farmhouse, and on 7 July I was taken away. Before leaving I changed into civilian clothes, leaving all my army clothes behind. My escape Aids Box was useless because the milk tube had broken and spread over all the contents. TOP TURNET CHU I left it with my helpers along with 1000 Francs taken from my escape Purse. Several days later I joined Lt McKEE of my crew and from there we travelled together.

LT MCKEE'S STORY BEFORE JOINING LT WETZEL:

I saw the engineer and co-pilot bale cut. After letting the bombardier know that we were baling out I followed the co-pilot, feetfirst. In leaving the plane my back hit something and I passed out but PLANE plane crash in a road and burn. A part of it had fallen away and was burning in a field.

I landed in a wheat field. My only injury was a shell-fragment in the falm of my left hand. Feeling stunned I lay down to rest but two boys rode up on bicycles and helped me unbuckle my chute. One of the boys hid my chute and Mas West while the other took me, on the bicycles, to a farmhouse about four kilometers away. I was hidden in a hayloft after being given civilian clothing and food. The next day a Frenchman, who spoke a little English, came to see me. He examined my escape Aids Box and took with him one of my escape photographs. JOURNEY APPANGED

Ally and G. Arasmy The morning of 6 July 1943 one of my helpers put me in a cart under burlap bags and drove me to a field where I spent the night. The next day two Frenchmen collected and took me to another farmhouse. After a night in a barn I moved to still another farm where I was Rept in a chicken house until 10 July. Two Frenchmen came on bicycles to take me away and after joining Lt WETZEL my subsequent journey was arranged.

SUBJECT: Safeguarding of P/W Information.

TO : Personnel concerned.

- 1. It is the duty of all Americans to safeguard information which might, either directly or indirectly, be useful to the enemy.
- 2. It is an offense, carrying heavy penalties, to publish or to communicate to any unauthorized person any information which might be useful to the enemy.
- 3. Information about your escape or your evasion from capture would be useful to the enemy and a danger to your friends. It is therefore SECRET.
